PROJECT PROFILE: Preserving natural and cultural resources through Traditional Ecological Knowledges



The NPLCC has been successfully collaborating with Tribes and First Nations since its inception. Beginning in 2012, a series of projects were funded to assist Tribes and First Nations with utilizing Traditional Ecological Knowledges (TEKs) to understand how climate change is affecting cultural and natural resources. This information will be essential in developing strategies to increase resiliency and adaptation.

- » TEKs are the primary indigenous way of understanding relationships among species, ecosystems, and ecological processes. TEKs can play a vital role in climate change assessment and adaptation efforts that bridge human and environmental systems.
- » These projects spanned from California to Alaska partnering with the Tolowa people, the Heiltsuk Nation, Organized Village of Kasaan, Quartz Valley Indian Reservation and the Karuk, Yurok, Tulalip, and Swinomish Tribes. Collaboration with the Northwest Climate Science Center provided a total of \$345,650 in funds to eight projects.
